## The Hoffmann Award: Change for Good

Encouraging positive lasting change—change for good—is the hallmark of New Haven School.

Each year, the prized Hoffmann Award recognizes a student who has made significant positive change in the way he chooses to participate in the New Haven School community.

This year, the Hoffmann Award goes to Marco, a young man who says he was "transformed" by his experience here.

"New Haven has helped me prepare for a better life and a better future," Marco declares. "I realized that my perception that life was unfair was false."

"I had to make the most of the gifts I was given; I had to stop being selfish and help others," he continues.

Still, it's been a long road for the once-troubled teen. When he entered New Haven some 18 months ago, Marco was severely depressed. Abusing drugs and alcohol, Marco was also performing poorly in

school; adopting the role of class clown helped to hide his depression while fueling an increasingly defiant attitude.

And the situation didn't magically improve once he became a student at New Haven. Forced to take a hard look at himself and his actions only increased his depression. His actions became increasingly destructive. At the same time, he was haunted by fear of failing himself and his family.

#### North County Trade Tech High School

Not content with just changing young lives, New Haven's Board of Directors is the vision and the moving force behind the successful launch of North County Trade Tech High School, a charter high school that is charting a path into the future. It's a path that recognizes the value, dignity, and promise that lies ahead for students who are well trained in technical careers as part of their high school education.

It's also a path that removes the need for a student to choose between college prep or vocational prep. Trade Tech teaches the importance and virtue of being fully prepared to design, engineer, or build. Trade Tech students study logic, problem solving, and critical thinking as well as blueprint reading and structural engineering.

Trade Tech, which opened one year ago in Vista, is a high school for those who "do". It's for the student who sees with his or her mind's eye, and who wants to be creative in a substantive way. "Building" at Trade Tech means more than just building buildings. As with New Haven, it means building lives, building self-esteem, and building respect for the creative talent that enables the architect to envision, the engineer to design, and the contractor to build.

At Trade Tech, eyes are firmly on the future. The school is teaching the methods and means of building green. Its graduates are the architects and engineers who will take us into the next generation of building. They will literally build the future.

"I've always had an interest in children's causes," he says. "Four years ago, Kevin Fleck, who was the Chairman of the Board at that time, introduced me to New Haven and Doreen Quinn. I took a tour of the Vista campus, and I knew I wanted to be involved."

Asked what makes his role at New Haven rewarding, Donn ticks off a number of reasons.

"Observing New Haven's programs as they become stronger and produce greater outcomes for our

One of our young men commented, "That was the coolest thing I have ever done. After we built the hoop, those guys [Hess executives] wanted to shoot hoops with us."

#### In the Spirit of Planned Giving

Charitable IRA Rollovers

The Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008, signed into law on October 3, renews a temporary provision that allows donors age 70½ or older to make a direct, tax-free rollover of up to \$100,000 from a traditional or Roth IRA to a qualified charitable organization such as New Haven Youth & Family Services, but only until the end of 2009. A direct rollover will be much better for most donors than a taxable IRA withdrawal followed by a charitable gift.
